The **UNSC** is a crucial platform for chief statisticians and leaders of national statistical systems (NSSs) globally. This year's event saw a remarkable turnout, with over 550 participants from 108 countries representing 52 agencies and non-governmental organizations. The agenda was diverse, featuring 350 written statements, 65 in-person side events, and 33 virtual side events, all dedicated to exploring the paramount importance and standardization of statistics in our rapidly evolving world. The overarching theme of the event was 'Better Data, Better Lives', highlighting the indispensable role of high-quality statistics in advancing global well-being.



STATISTICAL COMMISSION 2024



MEMBERSHIP

The Statistical Commission is composed of 24 member countries of the United Nations, elected by ECOSOC to ensure a fair geographical representation. Members serve a term of four years.

In its 55th session, the Commission acknowledged the crucial role of the Statistical Commission in coordinating global statistical programs. It emphasized the need for adaptable statistical practices amidst changing data landscapes. To promote inclusivity, the Commission recommends that ECOSOC endorse the draft resolution on the need to enlarge the membership of the Statistical Commission, "An inclusive and representative Statistical Commission to leave no one behind". As per the recommendation, ECOSOC will elect 54 members, ensuring equitable geographical representation, compared to the current 24 members. The enlargement will occur progressively in three steps, beginning from the fifty-seventh session of the Statistical Commission in 2026 to the fifty-ninth session in 2028.

BUREAU MEMBERS #UN55SC'S

The Commission, also known as the Bureau, comprises the Chairman, three Vice-chairmen, and the Rapporteur. During inter-sessional periods, the bureau members are elected by the Commission members, Bureau officials and the Secretariat regarding the forthcoming session's Bureau composition.

Bureau members are elected for a term of one year, with the possibility of being re-elected for an additional year if deemed appropriate. Commission members are requested to nominate candidates, and the election takes place at the beginning of each session, usually by acclamation. The election of officers took place on February 27, 2024, at the start of the 55th session of the Commission.

MANDATE

In Resolution 3 of June 8, 2022, the Council:

- Reaffirmed the Statistical Commission as the primary coordinator of global statistical programmes and the United Nations statistical and data-related system (UN statistical system).
- Called for adaptive statistical practices to the changing statistical and data ecosystem, urging the UN system to report all statistical work to the Commission.
- Stressed the need for technological innovation and partnership building among others for coherent, comparable, and privacyconscious data generation.
- Assigned the Commission the role of apex for statistical discussions, knowledge exchange and sharing of best practices, setting standards, supporting national statistical systems, advocating for professionals, and fostering innovation.
- Highlighted the importance of adhering to the Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics and supporting developing countries in strengthening their statistical systems.

PHYSICAL EVENT: MAIN COMMISSION SESSION

This collaborative effort is driven by the substantial engagement of the global community, with the overarching goal of easing the burden on participating countries in international endeavours.

















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MALAYSIA COMMITMENT IN THE #UN55SC



With DOSM's pivotal role in coordinating Malaysia's statistical system, our participation in this esteemed gathering was vital to advocate for our nation's interests and uphold our commitment to evidence-based decision-making. In line with the invitation, Malaysia also participated in the meeting and high-level seminar that were held physically from 23 February 2024 until the commission convened to exchange the country's experience and best practices with other NSOs and Statistical Agencies.

Submitted 33 Written Statements of Malaysia (WS) Emphasises its importance by supporting the UN's efforts for improved statistical guidelines across economic, social, and environmental sectors. This approach addresses Malaysia's statistical requirements and challenges, ensuring alignment with global standards for producing reliable and comparable data. DOSM aims to empower member nations to produce credible and timely official statistics.

DELIVERED 11 ORAL STATEMENT (OS)

ITEM 3(A): FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES OF OFFICIAL STATISTICS

Malaysia is advocating for the establishment of an Independent Advisory Board to promote inclusivity. The Board's membership should include representatives from various regions and sub-regions to ensure compliance with the regulatory framework of different countries. This will allow for a review of the principles and their definitions in light of current circumstances and address non-compliance and non-implementation of the Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics. It's also crucial to have a diverse range of experts onboard to ensure a thorough and comprehensive review. This forward-thinking approach will benefit all stakeholders, and we encourage its adoption.

ITEM 3(C): HIGH-LEVEL GROUP FOR PARTNERSHIP, COORDINATION AND CAPACITY-BUILDING (HLG-PCCB)

Malaysia has acknowledged and expressed support for the Report of the HLG-PCCB for Statistics related to the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The country also endorses the Hangzhou Declaration and looks forward to collaborative initiatives, including a new program on citizen-generated data to involve individuals and communities in data production. This citizengenerated data will be used to measure the achievements of the SDG at the local level. Malaysia has approved plans for the second phase of the realignment of the Cape Town Global Action Plan and the work on potential outcomes of the fifth UN World Data Forum. Additionally, Malaysia has welcomed and approved the proposed work plan of the HLG-PCCB for 2024, committing to participate in the United Nations World Data Forum annually.

ITEM 3 (E): GOVERNANCE STATISTICS

Malaysia supports the Praia Group's collaboration with regional partners to develop governance statistics methodologies, emphasizing the importance of diverse perspectives. Regional engagement ensures adaptability to varied cultural and institutional contexts in Southeast Asia, enhancing relevance. Malaysia suggests incorporating practical experiences from member countries to emphasize localized knowledge and address unique challenges. Sharing practical experiences can strengthen the Praia Group's methodologies, making them more robust and reflective of diverse national situations.

ITEM 3(B): WORKING METHODS OF THE STATISTICAL COMMISSION

Malaysia endorsed the Draft Resolution on an inclusive UN Statistical Commission, emphasising diverse perspectives and equitable representation. It committed to supporting efforts for greater inclusivity and appreciated the Bureau of Statistics Commission's work. Malaysia also welcomed the increase in Statistical Commission membership to 54 and recommended simultaneous expansion for equitable development. Moreover, it supported expanding the Bureau's analysis of the UN's statistical system, highlighting the importance of collaborative efforts in advancing global economic statistics and pledging openness to engaging in relevant initiatives.

ITEM 3(D): BIG DATA AND DATA SCIENCE

Malaysia commends the insightful findings of the 10-year review of the UN Committee of Experts on Big Data and Data Science for Official Statistics (UNCEBD). Malaysia advocates updating UNCEBD's mandate to address current needs, prioritizing capacity building, collaboration, data quality. Malaysia applauds UNCEBD's establishment of the UN Global Platform and proposes enhancing collaboration through improved communication strategies, such as website upgrades and social media engagement. Malaysia has been actively advancing the ASEAN-Help-ASEAN Big Data Pilot Project, notably contributing to projects with Brunei and Myanmar in 2023. Malaysia remains committed to providing technical consultation services and supporting big data initiatives.

ITEM 3(F): NATIONAL ACCOUNTS

Malaysia praises the 2022 progress on the 2008 SNA update, recognising the transformative impacts of digitalisation and globalisation on Emphasising the importance of incorporating well-being and environmental sustainability into economic decisions, appreciates the focus of recommendations on these issues. We commit to strengthening our statistical capabilities per the recommendations and promoting collaboration among international statistical bodies, National Statistical Offices, and countries.

















DOSM HIGHLIGHTS AT #UN55SC

ITEM 5(F): ICP

Malaysia actively endorses the implementation of the International Comparison Program (ICP) and anticipates the release of the ICP 2021 results in early 2024. The Department of Statistics Malaysia (DOSM) supports the ICP2021 programs and is dedicated to meeting the timeframe set by the Asian Development Bank (ADB). Malaysia commits to participating in the ICP 2024 cycle, using it as the benchmark year and adhering to the current ICP cycle's implementation approach. Plans for the 2024 ICP cycle involve initiating implementation in Q1 2024, with surveys scheduled for 2024 and 2025, focusing on the reference year 2024. Malaysia recognizes the value of the e-learning course on Purchasing Power Parity (PPP) Fundamentals and other research materials available on the ICP website. Additionally, Malaysia acknowledges the utility of ICP data for various indicators.

ITEM 3 (H): ENVIRONMENTAL-ECONOMIC ACCOUNTING

Malaysia appreciates the work of the Committee of Experts on Environmental-Economic Accounting, particularly on the SEEA Central Framework and SEEA Ecosystem Accounting. They support updates to align with the 2025 System of National Accounts, emphasizing its significance for policies on climate change, the circular economy, biodiversity, and sustainable finance. Malaysia also applauds efforts in updating industry classifications and supports the SEEA Ecosystem Accounting work program for 2023-2025, highlighting the importance of capacity-building and infrastructure investment for compiling SEEA statistics.

ITEM 3(K): GENDER STATISTICS

Malaysia welcomes the Secretary-General's report on Gender Statistics, endorsing innovative methods for collecting time-use data to ensure international comparability. Supporting a gender perspective in trade, business, and climate change statistics, Malaysia aims to monitor and address gender gaps in these sectors. The country agrees with the Statistics Division's call to analyse gender issues on the Commission's agenda, aligning efforts with the SDGs for progress in gender equality. Malaysia supports hosting the 10th Global Forum on Gender Statistics to demonstrate commitment and learn from global experiences. Additionally, Malaysia supports validating the conceptual definition of technology-facilitated violence against women (TF VAW) and developing tools to protect women's rights in the digital era.

ITEM 3 (G): ECONOMIC STATISTICS

Malaysia strongly supports the Network's initiatives, including the 2023 sprint meetings that focused on innovative economic statistics with an emphasis on wellbeing. Malaysia agrees to continue developing metrics for measuring people's well-being. The country supports ongoing regional and global consultations, reflecting a commitment to collaborative statistical priorities. While appreciating the Network's progress, Malaysia recommends a comprehensive evaluation to ensure alignment with regional priorities and global inclusivity, emphasizing relevance for countries in the global South.

ITEM 3(M): REGIONAL STATISTICAL DEVELOPMENT

Malaysia acknowledges and values the efforts made by the Statistics Division of the Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific, as well as its Bureau and member countries, to significantly improve statistical systems. The ESCAP groups have contributed immensely to this achievement by sharing their expertise, experience, and best practices in various domains. Collaboration among member countries in different statistical domains will not only help develop best practices in the Asia-Pacific region but also beyond.

Therefore, Malaysia is fully committed to supporting and promoting regional initiatives for sustainable development and a better future for all. To achieve this, Malaysia suggests that regional training institutes collaborate with their respective regional commissions to provide practical training on new tools and innovative practices to all member countries. Additionally, the Statcafe platform, webinars, and communities of practice will remain accessible to promote the sharing of best practices and encourage collaboration among member countries within and beyond the region.

Malaysia appreciates SIAP for its extensive efforts in providing member states with valuable statistical capacity-building activities. Malaysia has had the privilege of working with SIAP on several occasions and is keen to continue supporting and contributing to these activities in the future. Malaysia is open to in-kind collaboration with other organisations and development partners to enhance the national, regional, and global statistical system through capacity building.

Beyond GDP

This event highlights on Beyond Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and its initiatives. It gives a better understanding of the latest developments on Beyond GDP processes and the 2025 System of National Accounts (SNA). The 2025 SNA will support the measurement of well-being and sustainability that complement GDP and enhance its credibility in terms of policymaking.

The new developments in Business and Trade Statistics

The event, organised by the UN Committee of Experts on Business and Trade Statistics featured expert-led discussions on the UN's initiatives to foster collaboration among international entities to advance business and trade statistics. It highlights two pivotal programs: the Handbook on Integrating Business and Trade Statistics (HIBTS) and the Multinational Enterprise Information Platform (MEIP). HIBTS endeavors to establish a methodology for harmonising business and trade data globally, facilitating nuanced insights into traders' characteristics. On the other hand, MEIP, jointly developed by the OECD and UNSD, offers comprehensive information on multinational enterprises' structures and operations.

High Level Webinar: Beyond Gross Domestic Product (GDP)

This webinar focuses on Beyond Gross Domestic Product and initiatives within the United Nations. It aims to:

- Update the Statistical Commission on the latest developments regarding the Beyond GDP process;
- Reflect on the scope and modalities of contributions to the process by relevant statistical accounts and frameworks, including the 2025 System of National Accounts (SNA); and
- · Sensitize the Statistical Commission to the process.
- UN highlights great concern about the compounding increasing disconnect between economic growth and well-being and the human development index which is placing heavy stress on the environment due to climate change scientists warned that we may be missing a rapidly closing window to secure a liveable future and the need to move Beyond GDP.
- There is a wide range of data and aggregate measures within the SNA's sequence of accounts that can be used to inform discussion of important aspects of (material) well-being and sustainability. For example: household (adjusted) disposable income, final consumption and wealth; government impact on distribution of income, etc. The accounting rules and structures underpinning the SNA can be extended and adapted to organize data on the social and environmental dimensions of well-being and sustainability. For example: the System of Environmental-Economic Accounting (SEEA), is a complementary system to the SNA.
- Key changes proposed for the 2025 SNA, focussing on accounting for well-being and sustainability:

a. Within the sequence of economic accounts:

- Recognition of natural capital as a separate class of assets
- Recognition of depletion as a cost of production, affecting net measures (NDP, NNI, etc.)
- Explicit recognition of renewable energy resources (wind, solar, etc.)
- More attention to accounting for non-renewable energy resources:
 - 1. Split-asset approach, in line with SEEA
 - 2. More guidance on measurement
- More explicit guidance on accounting for biological resources yielding once-only products (timber, fish, etc.)
- Explicit guidance on accounting for the production of electricity and heating by households, for sale, and for their own final use.

b. Beyond the sequence of economic accounts:

 More explicit referencing to SEEA Central Framework and SEEA Ecosystem Accounting, which are complementary frameworks to account for issues related to environmental sustainability.

Advancing Official Statistics - Celebrating Milestones and Shaping the Future of FPOS

By advancing official statistics, there's a continuous emphasis on maintaining and improving the quality, relevance, and reliability of statistical data. This ensures that policymakers, researchers, and the public have access to accurate and trustworthy information for decision-making and analysis.

- Celebrating milestones provides an opportunity to recognise innovations and achievements in statistical methodologies, data collection techniques, and dissemination practices. This recognition encourages further innovation and motivates statisticians to adapt to evolving societal needs and technological advancements.
- Shaping the future of FPOS involves aligning statistical practices with emerging policy priorities and challenges. By integrating new data sources, methodologies, and technologies, official statistics can better address contemporary issues such as climate change, inequality, and global health crises.
- Discussions within the UN55SC framework also highlight the importance of upholding ethical standards and data governance principles. As data collection becomes more complex and diverse, ensuring privacy, confidentiality, and transparency becomes paramount to maintaining public trust in official statistics.

Lessons learned in applying the Degree of Urbanization

Different countries use different criteria to define urban and rural areas, which reflect on the decision-making process. This programme, "Lessons Learned in Applying the Degree of Urbanisation," focused on best practices for harmonising the definition of urban and rural areas by using administrative data for 1 km2 population grid cells that have the same shape and surface area to create a more accurate classification. The Degree of Urbanisation (DEGURBA) methodology is a combination of spatial and population density. It seems like the content discussed in the webinar is not to replace the existing definition of urban and rural, but rather complementary to urbanisation, especially to SDG indicators. This programme will give us the knowledge and opportunity to improve our decision-making based on real-time and reliable data.

It covered key topics such as the genesis of the FPOS, their relevance in today's fast-evolving data landscape, and the successes and challenges in implementation.

Representation in the Statistical Commission

- 1. DOSM supports the function and role of the Statistical Commission (SC) as the highest decision-making body for international statistical activities, in addition to being responsible for setting statistical standards and developing frameworks and methodologies, including implementation at the national and international levels.
- 2. Supports the implementation of the six proposed goals to ensure that the Commission remains inclusive and representative both presently and in the future:
- SC must remain a technical body;
- Ensuring the participation of relevant stakeholders is guaranteed;
- Representation within the SC reflects the present time;
- Membership in the commission leads to greater investment than membership;
- Regulations and approved standards are accepted by all stakeholders; and
- UNSC plays an active role in discussions regarding data and statistics

Launch of the International Data Masterclass

In a ground-breaking effort aimed at enhancing data and analytical literacy among senior leaders, the UK is excited to introduce the International Data Masterclass in Ghana. The UK is dedicated to cultivating a culture within government where decisions are informed by robust data, ensuring inclusivity for all. This initiative in Ghana will bolster data and analytical literacy among non-analytical leaders and future government officials, encouraging them to prioritize data and evidence in decision-making processes. The comprehensive curriculum will encompass a range of topics, including data analysis, data science, and data visualization, providing participants with the necessary skills to navigate the complexities of today's data landscape.

<u>Leveraging Data to Advance Human Development</u>

The event underscored the shift from GDP to HDI for assessing freedoms and emphasized the evolution and expansion of human development indices. It stressed the role of data in advancing human development by focusing on what's essential for people's well-being and freedom.

Measuring Wealth in Household Surveys in Low-And Middle-Income Countries: A Vulnerability Perspective

Wealth is a crucial component of household economic well-being, supporting current consumption and income, providing access to credit and investment opportunities, and acting as a safety net against unexpected events.

- The lack of reliable and comprehensive data on household wealth in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs) is a significant limitation for effective policy-making and economic analysis in those countries.
- The World Bank initiated a project to develop guidelines for improving the collection of wealth data in household surveys conducted in LMICs, with a focus on specific items of wealth that are more relevant in LMICs, such as livestock, land, and durable goods.
- The project aims to develop reliable methods for collecting and analyzing wealth data at the individual level, addressing intrahousehold inequality and the gender gap in wealth.
- Surveys on wealth are becoming increasingly important to study households' financial stability and response to economic policies and shocks.
- The project is expected to conclude its work by the end of 2025.

Enhancing Statistical Capacity through the Global Training on Small Area Estimation: Lessons from Asia Pacific, Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean

Small Area Estimation (SAE) is a modelling technique that incorporates additional information ("borrowed strength"), such as administrative records, censuses, surveys, spatial information, and commercial data, allowing the production of statistics at a disaggregated or granular level. SAE is crucial in addressing inequities and developing effective data-driven policies and interventions.

Representation and Inclusiveness in the Statistical Commission

The proposal underscores the importance of maintaining technical focus, involving relevant stakeholders, ensuring representation that aligns with the present time, encouraging increased investment from members, fostering universal acceptance of regulations and standards, and actively participating in discussions concerning data and statistics. These objectives are crucial for ensuring the Commission's inclusivity and representativeness in the present and future contexts.

Towards Official Statistics on Participation in Political and Public Affairs, and on Non-Discrimination and Equality: Engaging Prospective Users

Highlighted in the session is the ongoing preparation of two task teams within the Praia Groups, geared towards field-testing innovative methodological tools for generating globally comparable official statistics. As the production of governance statistics expands globally, the crucial concern arises: how can this data effectively inform policymaking amidst mounting crises and limited budgets? Governments and development partners face the challenge of optimizing resource utilization, emphasizing the critical need for maximizing the impact of available data in decision-making processes.

The Statistical Commission has updates latest developments of the Beyond GDP process to reflect on the scope and modalities of contributions by relevant statistical accounts and frameworks, including the 2025 System of National Accounts (SNA). More detailed consultations on Beyond GDP are expected in 2025. UNSC proposed formation of multi-disciplinary expert group comprised of experts from the social and demographic statistics, national accounts, environmental economic accounting, environment statistics and geospatial communities, academia and the private sector in 2024/25.

Advancing Official Statistics - Celebrating Milestones and Shaping the Future of FPOS

The webinar concludes a global effort to enhance understanding of Fundamental Principles of Official Statistics (FPOS) amid evolving data landscapes. It features discussions on FPOS development and relevance, proposing an Independent Advisory Board and refining implementation guidelines. Recognizing FPOS's importance, it emphasizes inclusivity and recognizes the Friends of the Chair Groups' role. Preparing for the 55th session of the Statistical Commission, initiatives aim to deepen FPOS understanding and address implementation challenges, with submissions including Implementation Guidelines outlines and Independent Advisory Board Terms of Perference

<u>High-Level Virtual Webinar - Representation in the Statistical</u> Commission

This webinar is driven to get more ideas from the participants from various countries to enhance the resolution's draft in ensuring that the work in the field of statistics and data is adaptive to the changing statistical and data ecosystem, as the UNSC is the primary body for the coordination of global statistical programmes.

Revision of the UN handbooks on Household Surveys

The revision of the UN handbooks on Household Surveys aims to be technically solid and recognized globally. There are needs to define the boundary of surveys that the handbook should strike a balance between principles and practical guidance, where principles need to be emphasized with practical solutions and references to existing materials. It was suggested and recommended that the revision for the UN handbooks on Household Surveys should covering survey project management items.

Rescuing the SDGs with Geospatial Information + Revised Short List

The Working Group on Geospatial Information (WGGI) is promoting two key programmes: developing a paper on "Rescuing the SDGs with Geospatial Information" for the 2025 Comprehensive Review and presenting the 2nd edition of the Shortlist results of the Global Indicator Framework analysis. The session discussed the draft resolution developed in consultation with various Permanent Missions to the United Nations for consideration for recommendation to the Economic and Social Council. The roadmap outlines a three-phase process to bridge the gap between statistical and geospatial actors within the global indicator framework, including preparation, design, development, testing, and measurement.

Measuring wealth in low-and middle-income countries: a vulnerability perspective

Wealth is defined as the whole amount of material and immaterial goods with a market value that can be changed against money or other goods. Wealth data are important for the analysis of vulnerable households to design more targeted and evidence-based policies. Wealth data quality can be improved by the collection of external information. There are challenges on issues of wealth ownership within the family on shared assets by all members of the households.





This information has been forwarded to the Asian Development Bank (ADB) for coordination. MALAYSIA CONTINUES TO STRENGTHEN ITS ROLE IN GLOBAL STATISTICAL DEVELOPMENT, ESPECIALLY IN CONTRIBUTING TO THE MEASUREMENT OF E-COMMERCE ACTIVITIES

PUTRAJAYA, MARCH 2, 2024 — Malaysia's participation in the 55° session of the United Nations Statistical Commission (UNOSSC) has successfully highlighted the country's capabilities and experise in producing official statistics overing economic, social, demographic, and environmental aspects. At the session, the Department for Statistics Malaysia (DOSM) persevented Malaysia in the UNOSSC. held for February 27 to March 1, 2024, in New York. The Commission plays a crucial role as the appx entity of the global statistical systems (NSSs) from around the world to shape international statistical standards and methodologies. Each year, representatives from approximately 133 UN member countries and international organisations gather to advance innovation in the production of official data and statistical information.

Representing Malaysia at UNSSSC were YBhg. Date' Sri Dr. Mohd Uzir Mahidin. Chief Statistician Malaysia and Ms. Ezatul Nisha Abdul Rahman, Director of the Strategic Communication and International Statistics Division. Their presence underscored Malaysia's commitment to actively contribute to the global discourse on current statistical matters.

Malaysia actively participated in side events, including meetings and high-level seminars, by sharing the country's experiences and best practices with national representatives and other international statistical agencies. This involvement extended to contributions in the development of key initiatives such as the Handdook of Household Survey. National Account System 2025, and e-commerce, starting on 23 February 2024. Algoing with its role as a member of a global expert group, Malaysia also book part in meetings such as the international Comparison Program (ICP) Governing Boord, Bureau Members of the ESCAP Committee on Statistics, the OC Statistics, Bureau Members of the ESCAP Committee on Statistics, the OC Statistics Commission (OCI Statiscia), and the Inter-Secretarial Working Octoor on Household: Survey (SWGHS). "Given DOSMs photal role in coordinating Malaysian's statistical system, our participation in this prestigious gathering is crucial to advancing the nation's interests and upholding our commitment to evidence—and data-based decision-making," added Dr. Uor:

A total of 33 agenda items were discussed and endorsed by the Commission, including: (i) Items for discussion and decision (15 agenda items); (ii) Items for decision (6 agenda items); and (iii) Items for indecision (6 agenda items); and (iii) Items for indecision (6 agenda items); resulting in crucial decisions for developing the global statistical system (https://unstats.un.org/NSCW/endecistational/documents/5). Malayala's full engagement individed submitting 33 written national statements and delivering 11 oral statements. Through this initiative, DOSM has emphasised its importance and supported the UN's efforts to strengthen statistical quidelines and metinodiologies across recent statistical domariam encompassing economic, social, and environmental issues. The aim of this endoavour is to ensure that member countries are capable of producing directal statistics of that are reliable, tende, and comparable on an international level. Among the topics focused on by the DOSM oral are the Statistical Commission, the 2010 Agenda for Sustainable Development, Data Science, Governance Statistics, National Accounts, Economic Statistics, Environmental-economic Accounting, Gender Statistics, Regional Statistics, Environmental-economic Accounts.

Malaysia was also invited as a guest speaker at a side event titled "Measuring Digital Trade." hosted by the Digital Economy and E-Commerce Program (ECDE) on 27 February 2024. During this session, Malaysias presented its pytotal role in measuring e-commerce, sharing the platform with Chief Statisticians from the IMP. UNCTAD, OECD, and the US Bureau of Economic Analysis. These collaboration efforts not only significantly contribute to global capacity building but also foster innovation, collaboration, and excellence within the international statistical recommunity.

Reflecting on the participation, Dr. Uzir remarked, "DOSM seized the opportunity to engage with world leaders and experts across various statistical domains. This commission serves as the primary platform for delegations to exchange ideas, share best practices, and collectively charit the course for the development of the global statistical framework. Specialised meetings were convened to exchange expertise and foster strategic cooperation with Talikistan, the United Arabi Emirates (UAE), the Asian Development Baris (ADB), the International Labour Organization (ILO), the World Health Organization (VHVO). ASEAN member countries, and OIC and OECD nations. Malaysia's substantial contributions, particularly in these technical relationships, underscore DOSM's commitment to actively shaping the international statistical landscape and strengthening strategic collaborations with other international agencies."
